


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Mission






School Deliveries Sept. - Dec. 2023





Number of Families Served in 2023 611






History of C.A.C.T.U.S.

C.A.C.T.U.S. was started in August 2000 by Linda Mackesty in memory of her granddaughter, Kayla Marie Adkins. Kayla lost her life on July 31, 1999 in a bicycle accident at age nine. The effort grew from providing a few school supplies to students in Sedalia schools to providing supplies for students throughout Pettis County.

In 2003, C.A.C.T.U.S. became a 501(c)(3) tax exempt charity. When Linda and Herb Mackesty moved out of state, Mary Jo Sartin became the coordinator in early 2010. During 2010 a website was established, a United Way Venture Grant was received, and then C.A.C.T.U.S was approved as a United Way partner in 2011.

C.A.C.T.U.S. is overseen by a Board of Directors and a Coordinator. Everyone who is involved with C.A.C.T.U.S. is a volunteer. There are no paid workers and donated funds go directly to buying school supplies with about 99% of funds typically going toward buying backpacks and school supplies.

Backpacks of school supplies are handed out each August in a distribution directly to families. School supplies are also provided to schools during the school year at the request of school counselors and social workers.
